Participatory Monitoring and Evaluation


Participatory Monitoring and Evaluation (PM&E) is an important management tool that involves stakeholders and beneficiaries to help track programme progress and facilitate decision-making processes in an intervention. By employing the right M&E tools to assess your work, your organization can design programme and activities that are not only effective and efficient, but also produce powerful results for the community.

Participatory Video

Participatory Video (PV) integrates a set of techniques to involve a group or community in shaping and creating their own movie. Making a video is fun, easy and achievable. In addition, it is a great way of bringing people together to explore issues, voice concerns, or tell stories.

Most Significant Change

Using Most Significant Change technique, or "monitoring without indicators", is a qualitative and participatory form of M&E, based on the collection, systematic selection, and analysis of stories of changes resulting from development activities

Combining these two methods helps to identify significant aspects of an intervention in a participatory manner and gives stakeholders an increased sensitivity to the impact of interventions on beneficiaries.

PVMSC is not a stand-alone tool; it can be used in addition to traditional M&E methods to increase the understanding of intervention outcomes

Training Objectives

This training will equip participants with knowledge and hands-on skills, including:

- A basic introduction to M&E, including Participatory M&E
- Conducting participatory monitoring and evaluation using a combination of Participatory Video and the Most Significant Change Technique
- Learning to conduct participatory analysis of MSC stories
- Learning to integrate PVMSC in an M&E system

What the training will cover

The PVMSC training is a combination of theory and practice to provide participants with knowledge on PM&E and hands-on technical skills and knowledge to use a combination of PV and MSC (PVMSC).

Topics addressed in the training include the concepts and theory of Participatory M&E, MSC theory, basic skills in handling a video camera and sound equipment, preparing the equipment for a film shoot, the practical steps for implementing PVMSC, facilitation in the selection and screening of the produced film, and integrating PVMSC in an M&E framework.

By the end of the training, participants will be able to produce a short movie of a significant change story

This training is organised for M&E practitioners, programme coordinators/managers, researchers, development workers, facilitators, participatory video practitioners and those curious and interested to learn about applying participatory techniques to evaluate social change projects and programmes.


Nur Hidayati
